Join us for our December program about White-tailed Deer.

White-tailed deer can be found throughout Florida from the panhandle to the keys. They prefer habitats with young, low-growing vegetation and edge, where the intersection of two different habitats allows deer to easily feed and avoid predators.

Deer are most active at dawn and dusk. When deer are alarmed, the tails are held erect and waved back and forth like a white flag, signaling a warning to other deer. When they are nervous, deer will stomp a foot and snort, before running off.

The safety of our membership is of upmost importance, we encourage everyone to please wear a mask.

Annual Survey October 31, 2023

The Etoniah Rosemary Survey is taken in Etoniah Creek State Forest every October. Santa Fe Audubon members and others were on three teams that volunteered this year.



The morning begins with learning to ID the Etoniah Rosemary plant, with or without blooms.



Flaggers mark the plants with pink survey flags.

Counters then come along, pull up the flags and then give their numbers to the Florida Forest Service leader.





A great holiday gift for your budding naturalist grades 5-7.




