

PARKING FEE: \$8.00 PER VEHICLE


We will meet at the parking area (near the restrooms) on the left, approx 1 mile from the Ranger Station.

Please allow up to 3 hours • DIFFICULTY LEVEL 3 - Will involve uneven terrain and walking on the beach




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A WING AND A PRAYER

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BIRD OF THE MONTH

SUMMER TANAGER (Piranga rubra)

band code "SUTA"



The only completely red bird in North America, the strawberry-colored male Summer Tanager is an eye-catching sight against the green leaves of the forest canopy.

The mustard-yellow female is harder to spot, though both sexes have a very distinctive chuckling call note.



Fairly common during the summer, these birds migrate as far as the middle of South America each winter. All year long they specialize in catching bees and wasps on the wing, somehow avoiding being stung by their catches.

For such a bright-red bird, Summer Tanagers can be hard to see in the tops of leafy green trees. As with many forest songbirds, the best way to find them is to listen, both for the robin-like song and for their very distinctive, muttering pit-tituck call note. Look for them in open woodlands (particularly of oaks and other deciduous trees) where they are usually in the mid-canopy and above.

We are expecting all 8 Kestrel nestlings in boxes 17 & 26 to fledge in the next five days.

The Avian Research and Conservation Institute (ARCI) has fitted each of them with either radios or cell phones for us to track where they go when they leave home. The cell phones, at 4 grams, are too heavy for the lighter weight males, so only the four females have phones, the males have VHF radio transmitters. The radios weigh less than 3 grams, have a longer range and less accuracy. The phones not only give pinpoint locations, but include a tiny solar panel to recharge the battery, which should last about a year. At last count, there are nine more healthy Southeastern American Kestrel nestlings in Santa Fe Audubon nest boxes. ARCI plans to fit them all with a radio or cell phone tag before the end of May.





BIRDING ETHICS

(including photography)

Practical guidelines that aim to mitigate the stress birds and their habitats face when humans intrude.

- Leave pets home
- · Bring binoculars
- Mute cell phones
- Gently close vehicle doors
- · Talk softly/whisper
- · Keep bird call playback and pishing to a minimum.
- Walk quietly in woods (pick up feet)
- Avoid using a flash when taking photographs
- Keep your distance
- DO NOT flush or disturb birds (especially during spring nesting season)
- · Stay on established trails
- · Be alert for bird sounds/movements
- Coughing/sneezing? Stay away from group or, if possible, in vehicle
- · Respect other birders
- Wear earth tone color clothing, when possible
- · Stay hydrated and safe

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
