



RURAL AND FAMILY LANDS PROTECTION PROGRAM

The Rural and Family Lands Protection Program (RFLPP) was recently awarding \$250 million in this year's State budget!

This money will be allocated to fund the conservation of agricultural and conservation lands all around the State of Florida.

RFLPP is a program administered by the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services with the goal of conserving land by purchasing permanent agricultural land conservation easements.

These easements cover the majority of a property to restrict future development while allowing property owners to continue agriculture practices and wildlife management.

The next RFLPP application cycle will open sometime this winter, so anyone who is interested will soon have a chance to apply!

BIRD OF THE MONTH

AMERICAN OYSTERCATCHER

(Haematopus palliatus) band code "AMOY"

A boldly patterned shorebird with red-yellow eyes and a vivid red-orange bill, American Oystercatchers survive almost exclusively on shellfish-clams, oysters, and other saltwater mollusks. Because of this specialized diet, oystercatchers live only in a narrow ecological zone of saltmarshes and barrier beaches. Along much of the Pacific Coast they are replaced by the similar but alldark Black Oystercatcher. American Oystercatchers are numerous but sensitive to development and traffic on the beaches where they nest; they are on Partners in Flight's Yellow Watch List.

COOL FACTS:

The oldest American Oystercatcher was at least 23 years, 10 months old. It had been banded as an adult in Virginia in 1989 and was found in Florida in 2012.

Kestrel Corner

Good news from the Kestrel Corner this month. Not only did we have our first ever successful re-nesting Kestrel pair, but all four of her eggs hatched and the young were successfully raised, fledged during the first week of August. This is by far the latest in the summer we have seen in the ten nesting seasons we have had kestrel boxes in Etoniah Creek State Forest. With personnel from the Avian Research and Conservation Institute (ARCI) and the Florida Forest Service (FSS), we visited this last brood of young Kestrels during the last week of July and banded all four young and radio tagged one female and one male. The older siblings were almost ten days old before the last egg hatched. As a result, that young male was very much the runt and we feared he would not survive. We were happily wrong as our banding visit found him very close to the same weight as the others. Our total number of fledged Kestrels this year is sixteen, from six different boxes. Which is average for the last 5 years.

A little sad news is that right before time to fledge, one of our young Kestrels from another box was taken by a snake. Previously reported as fledged, once the images from the ARCI monitoring camera were reviewed, it was determined that a snake had been at work inside the box.

Milestones this year: This was our tenth nesting season, and we surpassed 100 fledged Kestrels (actual total is 113).



Again, thank you to Dr. Ken Meyer and the Avian Research and Conservation Institute (ARCI) for their collaboration on banding and attaching GPS tracking devices that phone home once a day with current coordinates on our Kestrels. Also thank you to all our volunteers.
